

Primary Care

First Contact	AccessibilityUse by people for each new problem
Longitudinal	 Relationship between a facility and its population Use by people over time regardless of the type of problem; person-focused character of provider/patient relationship
Comprehensive	 Broad range of services Recognition of situations where services are needed
Coordination	 Mechanism for achieving continuity Recognition of problems that require follow-up


What is needed is person-focused care over time, NOT disease-focused care.






Features of family medicine

A case that may help discern how transformations in health care challenge primary care

- The transformation is:
 - The increase in "complexity in health care and the multiplicity of relationships patients encounter (involving various professionals, families of patients, and other support systems) that go beyond the individual physician-patient relationship"
